Carthage Knocks Down No. 1 Hope

ATLANTA — The Carthage College women's basketball team stunned No. 1 Hope College 51-47 on Dec. 28 in the opening round of the Oglethorpe University Holiday Classic at the Dorough Fieldhouse in Atlanta, Ga.

The Lady Reds took their first lead of the game, 46-45, at 2:09 when Heather Gilmore made the front end of a two-shot foul. Diana Jacklin connected on the back end of a two-shot foul at 1:27 to make it 47-45. Two free throws by Katie Klemke with 58 seconds remaining bumped Carthage's lead to four points, 49-45. Hope's Philana Greene scored on a jumper in the lane at 44 seconds to cut the lead to 49-47.

With 27 seconds to go, Gilmore made the back end of a two-shot free throw for a 50-47 margin. Hope's Jenny Cowen missed what would have been a game-tying three-pointer with 18 seconds to go, and Greene followed with a missed trey at eight seconds. Rosie Dorn rebounded Greene's miss and was fouled with six seconds to go. Dorn made the first free throw but missed the second, and Carthage had its final, winning margin of four points, 51-47.

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Cal Lutheran Snaps George Fox Win Streak at 36 Games

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif. — Behind a group effort with 10 different players scoring, the Cal Lutheran women's basketball team snapped a 36-game win streak that had belonged to George Fox University with a 54-48 victory. No CLU player scored in double figures in the win as Meaghan Goodenough and Channing Fleischmann led the Regals with nine points apiece.

George Fox was 32-0 last season.

GFU lost its next game also to the Lewis-Clark State College Warriors, who used a superior shooting touch to hold off the Bruins 64-51 and hand them their first home loss since 2007 to Puget Sound in the NCAA tournament, a streak of 29 straight games.

Oglethorpe Sets Board Record

ATLANTA — The Oglethorpe women's basketball team had four players pull down double-digit rebounds en route to a SCAC single-game team record 78 boards in an 90-75 victory over Sewanee.

Sarah Giles grabbed 16 rebounds off the bench to lead the Petrels. Kaci Palmore added 15 rebounds followed by double-digit efforts from teammates Taymah Jones (14 rebounds) and Katie Weeks (11 rebounds).

Oglethorpe had 25 offensive and 53 defensive caroms in totaling their school and conference single-game record 78 rebounds. The 78 boards are seven more than the previous SCAC single-game record set by Hendrix College against University of Dallas on Nov. 26, 2005. The 78 rebounds also smashed Oglethorpe's school record of 69 in a win over Spelman on Jan. 25, 2006

One of the great benefits of my job is the opportunity to interact with some of the most thoughtful people in the country. In particular, the sports information directors at Division III schools are always helpful and willing to go the extra mile to provide information.

We're privileged to have many great SIDs as readers, and some who have been with us since the beginning.

This past month, I received a package from Hope College SID Tom Renner, who for years was also the publicity director for the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association. I've worked with Tom since the 1990s so I expected the package to contain a media guide or other basketball-related information. I was partly correct. Much to my surprise, in the package was a new book of basketball poetry by Jack Ridl, professor emeritus of English at Hope. Tom's personal note wished us a happy holidays and happy reading. We were touched and dove into the book.

The book, "Losing Season," follows a fictional, small-town high school team and its community. Here's the book's description: Capturing the perspective of a mix of participants, including coaches, players, family and fans, and chronicling highs and lows along the way, the individual poems together create a composite view of a year of hope and defeat both on and off the basketball court.

After I read the collection of poems, I thought some of the works were appropriate for basketball coaches at any level, as they deal with the highs and lows, pain and glory, and human spirit that goes into the game of basketball.

For example, here's one of my favorites that read very true to me as a former high school and college basketball player:

*Dear Coach:
Remember the time you left me in after I'd missed seven in a row, tossed a few out of bounds, and let my man score twenty? Bad night. But you didn't pull me. You must have taken a lot for that. I can still hear the boos. I thought they were all at*

me. Why'd you leave me in? I've thought about that lately. Did you really think I'd come around? The others guys were furious sitting there watching me screw up. And after that game? What did you say? You must have had a second thought. It hit me last week. I was thinking back, remembering certain games. After that one, I wanted to run away. I had a thousand excuses. My family's fine, kids are growing up. We took a vacation this year. My mother's doing OK. Business is business, up and down. If you're ever in town, I sure hope you'll stop by to see us.

While I was fortunate to have success in my career, the point of the poem to me was that as players you always remember those highs and lows, and as you get older they mean even more. The bottom line is that as a coach you are shaping memories that last a lifetime for your players.

Moravian Upends Scranton 73-63 in Landmark Opener

SCRANTON, Pa. — In a matchup of nationally-ranked Pennsylvania powers, Moravian College rallied to earn a 73-63 win over The University of Scranton on the road to begin the 2009-10 Landmark Conference season on Dec. 5.

Moravian, which dropped two games in the Long Center last season including the Landmark Conference title game, used a balanced scoring attack with three players in double figures and a strong game at the free throw line for their second straight win. Senior guard Jessica Foran netted a game and season high 16 points to go with six rebounds and three assists while senior forward Kirsty Stearns had 15 points, seven boards, three steals and a pair of blocked shots for the Greyhounds.

Senior forward Alyssa Bisci tossed in 14 points and grabbed a game and season high ten rebounds for her first double-double of the season. The trio was 21-for-27 at the foul line as the Greyhounds connected on 28-of-37 free throws in the game (75.5 percent). Moravian made three more free throws than Scranton attempted in the game.

The Royals also had a balanced scoring attack with four players in double figures led by junior guard Megan Kopecki, who had 13 points to go with four rebounds and four assists. Junior guard Jennifer King tossed in 12 points and added seven rebounds, three assists and two blocked shots while senior center Molly Klusek contributed 11 points and a team high nine rebounds for Scranton. Freshman guard/forward KC Hawkes added 10 points and five boards off of the Royal bench.

Bowdoin Wins Maine Showdown with USM in Gorham

GORHAM, Maine — Seniors Caitlin Hynes and Leah Rubega combined for 32 points and 21 rebounds on 66 percent (14-21) shooting to lead Bowdoin College women’s basketball team to a 60-47 win over Southern Maine. The victory is the first in Gorham for the Polar Bears since December 2003, the year the squad reach the Division III title game. Southern Maine falls to 4-2 overall.

Bowdoin’s defense clamped down on the Huskies in the opening half, forcing nine turnovers and holding USM to 30 percent shooting from the field, including 1-of-8 from beyond the arc. The Polar Bears never trailed, getting started with a three-pointer from Kaitlin Donahoe in her first career start and jumping out to a 10-2 edge five minutes in. The Polar Bears lead bounced between four and eight points for the remainder of the half, but was trimmed to three points after a three-pointer from USM’s Curran Leighton with under a minute to play. But a jumper by Colleen Sweeney and a buzzer-beater by Alexa Barry extended the lead to seven points, 25-18, at the break.

Southern Maine was able close to within two points after Nicole Paradis nailed a lay-in to cap an 8-2 Husky run with 11:30 to go. But Bowdoin responded quickly with a bucket by Sabrina Cote and a trifecta from Ellery Gould to push the lead back to seven points. The Polar Bears poured it on from there, pushing the lead into double-digits for the final five minutes of play.

Bowdoin had lost four of its last five meetings against their rivals from Gorham, and had not beaten them in Hill Gymnasium since December 2, 2003. Overall, the Polar Bears have a 9-4 mark against Southern Maine since 2000.

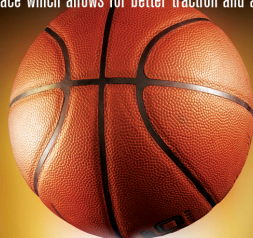
Ditzler Wins 200th Game

Ditzler, now in her 17th season with the Warriors, earned her first career win came in her second game as the Lycoming head coach, defeating Kean College 64-52 on Nov. 21, 1993.



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Courtside With.....

Jennifer Kroll, Wellesley College

WDIIN: What made you want to be a college coach?

Kroll: I had such a great college experience. Basketball was a huge part of that. I chose Northwestern because it was a great academic school and I grew up wanting to play Big Ten basketball. I was fortunate to have great coaches who helped shaped my experience. When I graduated I missed that environment and I had a passion for teaching. So coaching made sense to me.

WDIIN: What do you like about being a Division III basketball coach?

Kroll: The players have less of a sense of entitlement and they are easy to motivate. They aren't on scholarship, so their primary reason for playing is that they love the game. They could have jobs on or off campus to help pay for their education. But because they love the sport, they choose to forgo those opportunities to play college basketball. I admire that.

WDIIN: How would you describe the NEWMAC as a basketball conference?

Kroll: We've only played three NEWMAC games so far. Having coached in the Empire 8, the UAA, and the Liberty League, I would say the NEWMAC is a tough DIII conference that can shift its balance. If you look at the history of women's basketball in the conference, you don't have just one or two teams winning the title every year. That bodes well for a team like us that is trying to build a program to be competitive.

WDIIN: How would you describe your coaching philosophy, offensively and defensively?

Kroll: We like to try to create offense out of our defense. If we can create turnovers we can score quick baskets. To be successful at this, you have to have very well-conditioned, quick, disciplined players. We also have to be flexible enough to play a different style and still control tempo. The more versatile and hard-working you are as a player, the more you will contribute in our system.

WDIIN: What is the most memorable win of your coaching career? Loss?

Kroll: The first thing that pops into my mind is winning my



first NCAA tournament game a couple years ago at the Messiah regional. But when I think about it more, probably last year's St. Lawrence team that only returned two starters. We were picked really low in the coaches pre-season poll and we lost to Union College twice during the regular season. But the players, having been to NCAA's before, knew the hard work and determination it took to peak down the stretch when it mattered. We won the conference championship game against that

same Union team and got the automatic bid. They willed it to happen. I was so proud of them. As far as losses, there isn't one that sticks out more than another. It is always the last game of the season when you have to address your team for the last time as a group that is the toughest. Obviously, the goal is to win that last game. That would be the ultimate!

WDIIN: What is the biggest challenge you face as a coach?

Kroll: Preparing student-athletes to be successful upon graduation. Having them understand how their experience on the basketball floor can help shape their experiences in life. Getting a team to show up everyday for 2-3 hours is easy. Getting a team to show up everyday for 2-3 hours and work hard the entire time is challenging. But the most successful teams are the ones that can do that. Work ethic and satisfaction are so closely tied together. If players graduate from our program and understand this, it is the best thing we could have done for them.

WDIIN: When was the last time you attended a coaching seminar or read a basketball book? Did you learn something new?

Kroll: Well, I have to admit, right now I am reading a book titled "Infidel." We have a volunteer coach on our staff this year who is from Somalia. He is a really unique individual in so many ways and he adds so much to our program without any reward

but the sheer experience itself. I am trying to understand the environment he grew up in where most families are split up because of the war going on there.

WDIIN: Do you have a coaching mentor or someone who helped you with your career?

Kroll: My mentor has undoubtedly been Marnie Dacko. Marnie is the head coach at the University of Massachusetts. She was my assistant coach at Northwestern and I worked on her staff at Cornell. I learned from Marnie how to balance the intensity of what we do as coaches on a daily basis with the things and people that are most important to us. She has been a mentor in "life" as much or more as she has been in "coaching." And she can make me laugh more than anyone else!

WDIIN: If you could change one basketball rule, what would it be and why?

Kroll: I would let the players stand on the bench during the game, not just to cheer on "big plays." I don't believe that it is unsportsmanlike or detracting from the game. I think it would help set the tone and attitude for those players as well as the entire team to be as invested as possible. As a player, I spent a lot of time on the bench and I was up cheering my teammates on the entire game.

SUNY Cortland senior Jessica Laing is the *Women's DIII News* Player of the Month for December.

Laing is averaging 17.3 points and 12.8 rebounds a game for the Red Dragons, and has registered a double-double in seven of eight games this season. Lisa Nassin's two free throws with 6.8 seconds left proved to be the difference as Lake Forest College tipped St. Norbert College 68-67 in a Midwest Conference opener at the LFC Sports Center.

The two archrivals battled down to the wire in a game where neither team led by more than three points in the game's final minutes.

Rachel Hermus' jumper with 5 minutes 20 seconds left tied the game at 63-63, but the Green Knights would score just four points the rest of the way. Tatiana Moore and Kate Grunauer each made 1 of 2 free throws to give Lake Forest a 65-63 lead with 2:31 left. St. Norbert's Jamie Kuhl canned a jumper with 2:06 left, and neither team would score until the final 30 seconds. Nassin made 1 of 2 free throws with 25 seconds left, and Hermus answered with a hoop with 12 seconds left for a 67-66 St. Norbert lead. After being fouled, Nassin connected on the game-winning free throws.
